Sachuest Point National Wildlife Refuge U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service

Welcome to Sachuest Point National Wildlife Refuge! This refuge is one of five national wildlife refuges in Rhode Island. From the mid-1600's to the early 1900's, Sachuest Point was used for farming and sheep grazing. During World War II, the U.S. Navy used this site for a rifle range and communications center. In 1970, a 70 acre donation from the Audubon Society of Rhode Island led to the establishment of Sachuest Point National Wildlife Refuge. Today, with the land transfers from the Navy, the Refuge totals 242 acres which provides an important stopover and wintering area for migratory birds.

Careful!

- ◆ Slippery rocks and heavy surf are often present and can be dangerous. Never turn your back to the ocean.
- ◆ Poison Ivy and ticks are abundant.
- ◆ Stay on designated trails to avoid hazards and minimize disturbance to wildlife.
- ◆ Steep banks are treacherous. Approach trail edges with care.
- ◆ Use marked shoreline access points for your safety and to minimize erosion.
